What happened

- On January 4, an email was incorrectly sent to 5,502 scholarship recipients, congratulating them on receiving the Platinum Presidential Scholar Award, which they had not earned.
 - The email should have been sent to only <u>95 Platinum Presidential Scholar Award</u> recipients.
- The Platinum Presidential Scholar Award is valued at \$48,000 (\$12,000 per year, for four years).
 - The award requires a minimum high school GPA of 3.90, and a test score of 1450 or higher on the SAT or 33 or higher on the ACT.
 - The criteria are stated clearly on the OU website and scholarship materials.



Why it happened

The miscommunication was a result of human error.

How we responded

- A correction email was sent within 2.5 hours to all affected students.
- A further detailed apology email was sent the next day. In addition, follow-up calls were made to those who contacted OU.
- Enrollment management teams reviewed protocols and processes for data extraction to ensure accuracy.



Student/Parent Reaction

- Reactions ranged from disappointment to understanding that mistakes happen. To clarify, the scholarship requirements were cited, and many students realized they didn't qualify.
- Subsequent to the follow-up apology, many students and parents appreciated the university's engagement and contrition.
- Students and parents were interested in learning more about additional scholarship opportunities at OU.
 - Students learned they could submit updated transcripts and test scores.
 - To date, 27 students have been awarded higher-level awards.



- In summary, we recognize that people are the backbone of our organization, and whenever people are involved, there is a risk for human error.
- As a learning organization, we are committed to ongoing improvement as we work with integrity to correct our errors.
- Furthermore, correcting our errors is essential as we provide the highest level of education, effective processes, and outstanding responsiveness as we continue to be the university of choice.



NSF Grant for Cyber Security

Impact of OU Graduates




Employed in Michigan




- Career Services hosts a two-day Winter Career Fair
 - Feb. 2 in-person event is rescheduled for Feb. 22
 - Feb. 3 event was held virtually
 - 230 students attended, and participated in 996 interviews
 - 72 employers participated







Benefits to OU



- Double the representation.
- Opportunity with Macomb County
 - At the state Senate and congressional level, we get parts of Macomb County.
 - The new 9th state Senate district (another example of the tension between constitutional criteria) and especially in a new Macomb-centric congressional district (the new 10th).
- We lose Pontiac at the state House level (new 54th vs current 29th).

Did the Commission deliver?
