Our Response to COVID-19




- Health and safety remains highest priority






Heart Rate at Rest



- The context of the 2022 gubernatorial election will feature two opposing trends in Michigan politics.
 - The "midterm effect" the party of the president usually does poorly in US House and Senate contests.
 - This dynamic may have impacted Michigan at the state level:
 - > Only once time since 1976 has Michigan elected a governor of the same party as the sitting president in the midterm following that president's election.
 - The "reelection effect" since 1976, only one sitting Michigan governor has been denied reelection.





The Bella Rozencweig Hirsch Endowment for Biomedical Ethics

- President Pescovitz's major gift created endowment to support the program's vision and to honor her mother
- Overall endowment fundraising goal: \$1 million
