



Advocating for increasing public funding



- In February of 2020, we initiated "Strive for 45" campaign, an effort to increase state funding to at least \$4,500 per student.
- "Strive for 45" campaign is making a fundamental difference in our effort to bring equity to higher education funding in Michigan.

Advocating for increasing public funding




- Governor's proposed budget would achieve the campaign's objective over the next four years.
- The Michigan House of Representatives' proposed budget includes the full amount of "Strive for 45."

Equitable funding for public universities

- State funding more equitable for Oakland University, Grand Valley State University, Saginaw Valley State University, UM-Flint, and UM-Dearborn.
- Our advocacy and the increase in state funding may potentially transform Michigan's higher education landscape.

(0.001). Most patients were female in both the FB&V and UV groups with 51.1% and 51.8%, respectively, while the FV group had a majority of males (51.3%). The median Elixhauser weighted score was 12 (IQR 3, 22) for FV&B, 10 (IQR 2, 20) for FV, and 9 (IQR 0, 17) for UV groups (p < 0.001). In-hospital mortality was 7.1% in the FV&B, 10.3% in the FV group, and 12.8% in the UV group (p < 0.001).  Anthony Fauci, chief medical advisor to President Joe Biden.





Looking Ahead

- Application Decrease
 - Nationally a 12% decrease in applications for the 2022 application cycle
 - OUWB experienced a 5% decrease
- Decreases in OU applications
 - 25% decrease in OU applicants since peaking in 2019
- Total Michigan applicants are flat
 - 1,471 Michigan applicants in 2019 vs 1,478 Michigan applicants in 2022

- Established Adjunct Appointments in FMS





FMS Grant Applications and Funded Amounts




OUWB engagement in the community



Student Highlights


Leah Rotenbakh, Class of 2024, raises awareness of infant and maternal mortality with a project that other Michigan medical schools have adopted.
